March 2023: Patience


March is overflowing with a beautiful bouquet of days to inspire holiness. There are the feasts of St. Patrick and St. Joseph, and the blessed day of the Annunciation. St. Patrick and St. Joseph are spiritual fathers whose faithful patience reflects God's own merciful love, both bringing about conversion and deepening faith in others through the examples of patience they set. St. Joseph was reliably steadfast, always present to offer strength to his family. He is not quoted in the Bible, ultimately practicing His love for God, rather than simply preaching it. Saint Spotlight: St. Patrick

St. Patrick is the patron saint of Ireland, but was originally from England, a territory occupied by Rome when he was living in the 300s-400s A.D. As a teenager, St. Patrick was taken as a slave on a pirate ship. The pirates brought him to Ireland, where he worked as a shepherd. St. Patrick prayed every day, saying hundreds of prayers at morning and night. When it rained or snowed as he herded sheep, he did not feel it. His strength came from his patience, and his patience came from trusting so much in God, Who protected him and listened to his prayers. Several years later, St. Patrick made it back home, but had a dream that the Irish people were calling to him, asking him to come back and help them. St. Patrick listened to where God was calling him, and returned to Ireland to teach people about God. He became a priest, and later, a bishop. His love for God always led him forward, to never give up in his work converting souls. For about 40 years. St. Patrick preached about God, using three-leaf clovers to teach about the Three Persons of God: the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. Through poverty and difficult times, God was with St. Patrick, who was carried through by Him.
